Farmers Market



FUEL FARM

The City of Monroe has recently entered into an agreement for the purchase and installation of a 10,000 gallon AvGas Fuel Storage and Dispensing System for the Monroe-Walton County Airport. After several months of discussion and planning, the Airport Committee and City of Monroe decided on the details of the project, and an Invitation to Bid was published for the sought after system. The fueling system will greatly improve airport traffic and provide for an increased revenue stream from the airport thru the sale of fuel. The project will be almost entirely funded by the Airport Improvement Program (AIP).



South Broad TE Project

The South Broad TE Project is part of the Transportation Enhancement grant

funded by the Georgia Department of Transportation for a street-scape project along State Route 11 from Broad Street to Mill Street. With this grant, the City will make provisions for pedestrian-oriented facilities such as sidewalks and multi-purpose paths. The improvements include but are not limited to: sidewalks. bicycle trails, street lighting, and the planting of trees along the South Broad Street Corridor. The enhancements will make it easier for

The City of Monroe is always looking for ways to engage with our citizens. We recently launched our mobile and on-line, city app "You Click We Fix" powered by SeeClickFix. This app allows our citizens to report quality-of-life issues directly to the departments of the City of Monroe. Several types of issues can be reported including potholes, broken sidewalks, litter, and flooding just to name a few. When using the mobile platform, citizens can upload pictures, describe the issue, as well as provide a location of the issue. Once the issue is reported, the City of Monroe acknowledges the issue and anyone following the issue will receive an alert once the issue is fixed and closed. Issues can be tracked and submitted directly from the City of Monroe's website at http://www.monroega.com/ departments/finance-department/communityrelations/seeclickfix. Citizens can also download the app from the app store via itunes for iPhone users or googleplay for android users.

Fire Safety Did you know???

- In 2007-2011, smoke alarms sounded in half of the home fires reported to U.S. fire departments.
- Three of every five home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.
- The death rate per 100 reported home fires was more than twice as high in homes that did not have any working smoke alarms (1.18 deaths per 100 fires), either because no smoke alarm was present or an alarm was present but did not operate, as it was in homes with working smoke alarms (0.53 per 100 fires).
- No smoke alarms were present in more than one-third (37%) of the home fire deaths.
- The death rate from reported fires in homes during 2007-2011 that had at least one smoke alarm (0.61 deaths per 100 fires) was one-third (36%) lower than in homes that had no smoke alarms at all (0.95 deaths per 100 fires).
- In one-quarter (23%) of the home fire deaths, smoke alarms were present but did not sound.

The death rate was much higher in fires in which a smoke alarm was present but did not operate (1.94 deaths per 100 fires) than it was in home fires with no smoke alarms at all.

Monroe Fire Department has a free limited supply of 9 -volt batteries and smoke alarms with 10-year batteries. Please come by Monroe Fire at 139 South Madison Ave. or call 770-267-4446 for more information. Follow us on Facebook at www.facebook.com/monroefirega
