

Our beloved Downtown was transformed to 1960s Hampton, Virginia with modern storefronts becoming Woolworth's, Sweetie's Ice Cream Shoppe, and Morrow's Fine Clothing. The movie set boasted period correct water fountains, streets signs, and picket signs. The scenes were reminiscent of civil rights protest, homecoming parades, and life changing court cases. Film crews lined the streets as actors took their respective places in each scene. For those lucky enough to witness the action, it was definitely a worthwhile experience. While the movie filming in Monroe is noteworthy, the story of the women on which the movie is based is even more impressive.

Hidden Figures is the story of three African-American female mathematicians who worked for NASA during the Cold War. Hidden Figures tells the story of Katherine Johnson, Mary Jackson, and Dorothy Vaughn as they work to compute the algorithms responsible for sending John Glenn into orbit. These "Human Computers," housed separately from their counter parts, persevere through the height of the Civil Rights movement securing their own place in American History.

Local leaders are at the helm of implementing a program that will help guide the conversation about housing in the City of Monroe. The Georgia Initiative for Community Housing (GICH) is a program championed by the University of Georgia's College of Family and Consumer Sciences along with many other partnering organizations. GICH was launched in 2004; and since then, sixty communities have directly benefitted from the program.

The City of Monroe is at the beginning stages of the program having attended their first GICH retreat in Dublin, Georgia in February. The team continues to grow and held a follow-up meeting in March.

The purpose of the GICH program is to facilitate communities in identifying housing needs, available resources, and potential obstacles to housing growth and improvement. The program is a three-year commitment of technical assistance from GICH facilitators, cross-community sharing, and developing a housing plan with objectives and goals.

The Monroe team is made up of elected officials, public safety officers, realtors, business owners, non-profits, members of the faith community, and residents. All team members have a vested interest in seeing Monroe grow and succeed.
